OUR TEAM

Our team is made up of 160 professionals comprised of Active Duty and Reserve Military, DOD Civilian, Contractors, and U. S. law enforcement agency liaison officers.



EXPERT ANALYSIS

Intelligence support by JIATF West helped law enforcement to interdict vast amounts of illicit drugs and chemical precursors destined for illicit meth production. Between 2009 and April 2012, the following amounts were seized by law enforcement:

- **1500 Metric Tons of chemical precursors**
- **2.5 Tons of Cocaine**
- **1.5 Tons of Heroin**

We have been supporting the U.S. counter-drug effort in the Pacific since 1989.

Every day, containers of legal chemicals are shipped to industrial sized labs for the illicit production of methamphetamine. These chemical precursors are used by transnational criminal organizations to manufacture methamphetamine by the ton.

Many nations throughout the **Asia-Pacific region are faced with increased levels of crime, weapons and human trafficking that inherently come with the trade of narcotics.**

The global trade of meth puts over 30 billion dollars* annually on the **black market, empowering some transnational criminal organizations with enough resources to overthrow or destabilize governments.**
