We engage with multiple partner organizations and units to provide a unique experience for students. Some activities include:

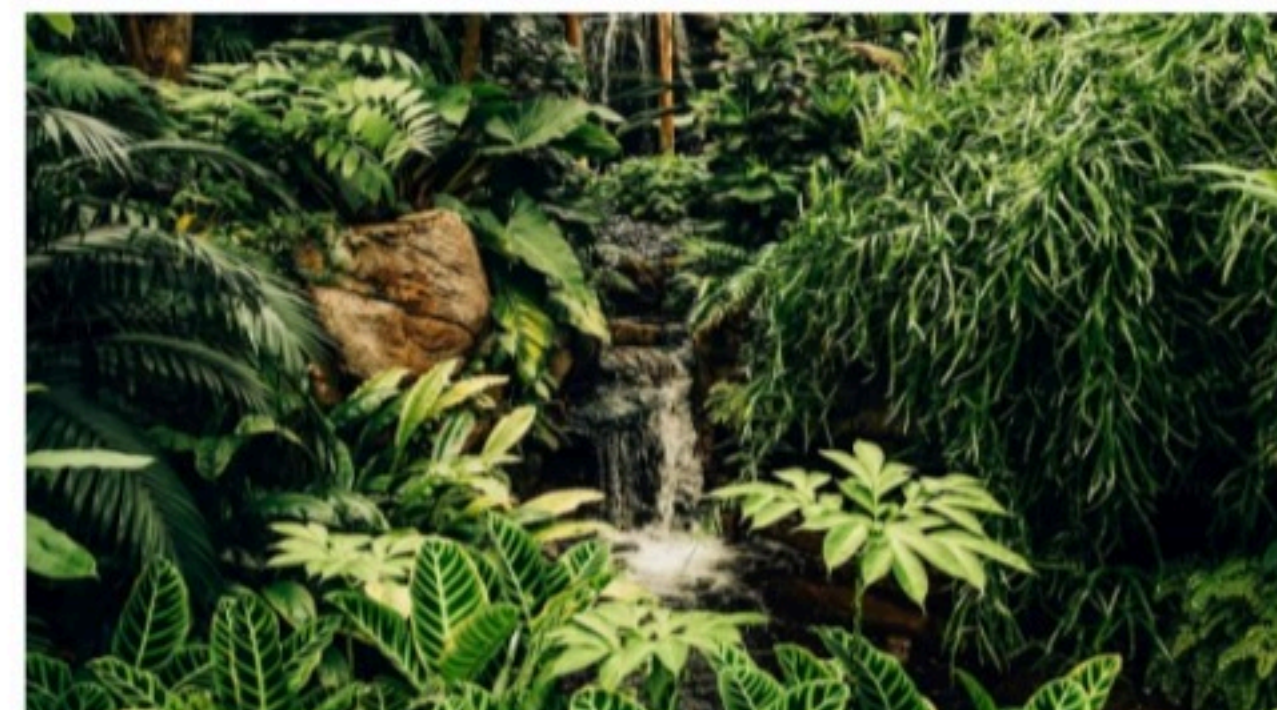

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Second, brown bag lunches are a regular occurrence during the work week for students.
